Investing Locally to Improve School Nutrition

Nutritious school meals are a vital source of nutrition for millions of children nationwide, giving them the fuel they need to grow, learn, and thrive. In addition to traditional school meal funding sources, USDA has provided extra financial support for schools since 2021, helping ensure they have the necessary resources to operate successful school meal programs. Some of this extra funding has allowed schools to buy local, unprocessed foods, helping area producers.

 \$1.8 billion on local foods, or about 16% of their total food spending.
- Participation in farm-to-school activities grew
 14% since the last census in 2019.
- School districts where many students qualify for free or reduced-price meals participate in farm-to-school programs at the same rate as other districts.
